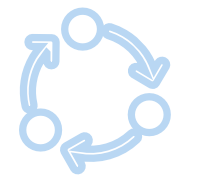

EXAMS & TERM PAPER

These activities will be a combination of mock project deliverables / meetings as well as exercises to help individuals better understand various aspects of IT Project management. You will be graded on your participation on these assignments

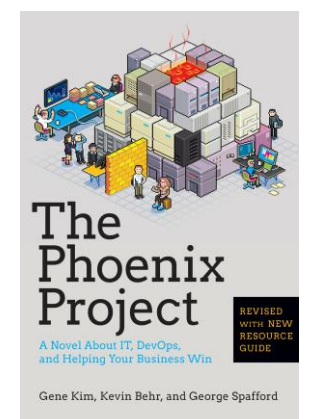
