III. Course Description

My primary goal in this course is to provide you with the basic tools required to be an educated user of financial statements prepared under generally accepted accounting principles.

This course provides a structured approach to the analysis of financial statements. We will meet for seven evenings. The course format includes free-form lectures, group discussions, problem-solving and discussion of recent events related to the analysis of financial statements.

IV. Grading and Related Policies

Grades will be based upon preparation and submission of:

- assigned homework,
- two problem sets, and
- an examination.

Your final grade will be calculated based upon the following information.

Students earning at least 308 points will receive the grade of "A" for the course. Students earning at least 276 points will receive at least the grade of "B" for the course. Students earning at least 243 points will receive at least the grade of "C" for the course. The "plus/minus" grade modifiers will be used at my discretion.

This is a graduate course. There are no opportunities for extra credit, grade repair, etc.

At the end of the course, I may award points to everyone in the class to adjust the overall average grade in the course and I may adjust the breakpoints between letter grades. Any decision to adjust scores will reflect the assumption that students earned 100 homework assignment points.

V. Homework Assignments

The homework assignments will help you understand concepts, apply your knowledge, and enhance your skills. Completing assignments in a timely manner will help you keep up with the tight class schedule.

Homework assignments are an important part of your grade in this class and I encourage you to spend the time required to complete each assignment. I expect graduate level work on each assignment. I will grade the assignments primarily on effort, not accuracy. All homework assignments are to be submitted to

and are due at the beginning of class. I will not accept late assignments. I will use the system clock to determine if assignments are late. Please, do not submit assignments in class or to the wrong email account. Be sure to name the files you submit with enough information for me to determine who submitted them and which assignment they pertain.

VI. Problem Sets

The problem sets provide an opportunity for you to increase your understanding of the course material. They require a level of effort beyond the level required to complete the

homework. They provide guided independent study related to the topics covered in class and in the textbook. **Do not underestimate the time required to complete the problem sets.** Be sure to allow enough time to complete these tasks thoroughly. The problem sets will be posted on Canvas during the first week of the course. Be sure to start working on the sets immediately.

VII. Examination

The examination will include problems similar to the problems on the two problem sets. The examination will appear on Canvas at 6:00 am on October 11th. I will accept completed examinations at

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until 11:59 pm on October 11th. Do not be late! I will not accept examinations after midnight.

While you have 15 hours to complete the examination, it is designed to be completed in less than three hours. You may use any material you like for the examination, but you may not consult with other people. The examination will be graded on accuracy and its compliance with instructions, including compliance with the Woods' Rules of Excel.

VIII. Excused Absence Policy

Regular class attendance, participation, and engagement in coursework are important contributors to student success.
